## NEP IS...

- Council-directed, City-Funded, Capital Improvements
  Program
- Provides RESIDENTS the opportunity to PROPOSE and SELECT enhancement projects for their individual neighborhood area
- \$7 Million BUDGET distributed among 14 designated NEP neighborhood areas
- Area funds allocated based on the number of households in each Neighborhood Area
- Rotates through 14 Neighborhood areas over seven-year period – TWO AREAS per year (2023-2029)
- Program supported by multiple City departments –
   Community Development, Parks, Transportation, Utilities
- Currently 25 NEP projects in planning/progress around the city in twelve neighborhood areas



## **NEP PROCESS**


- City allocates \$\$ to Neighborhood Area
- Residents submit ideas for spending \$\$
- City staff review ideas & generate projects
- Residents select projects to receive \$\$
- City implements projects in 3-5 years

#### Police and Fire departments to host meeting on behavioral health, transit safety

Tuesday, March 14, 6:30-8 p.m. North Bellevue Community Center 4063 148<sup>th</sup> Ave. NE





The Bellevue Police and Fire Departments continuously work together to expand and improve public safety. Recently, the City Council approved an investment in public safety, creating new positions and allocating resources for a Community Crisis Assistance Team and a Police Transit Team. Bellevue Police Chief Wendell Shirley and Bellevue Fire Chief Jay Hagen invite the community to learn more about these programs and to provide input.

The Crisis Assistance Team pairs mental health professionals from Bellevue Fire CARES and specially trained plain-clothes police officers to address calls from people in crisis. The Police Transit Team will provide community engagement, safety and security in and around light rail stations in Bellevue.

As we develop and begin these programs, we want your feedback to ensure we are creating a safe and equitable environment for everyone. In this community conversation, learn more about these programs, ask questions and provide feedback.

#### March 3 deadline for Eastgate/ Factoria NEP project ideas

Don't miss the opportunity to let the citv know what you'd like to see your neighborhood.

The project idea submission period is now open for the Eastgate/ Factoria Neighborhood Enhancement Program. NE

is a capital improvement program that provides residents in a neighborhood area the opportunity to propose and select small-scale physical projects that improve their quality of life and enhance the character in their neighborhood. The city has a budget of \$370,000 for the Eastgate/Factoria area to spend on projects.

Eastgate/Factoria residents can submit ideas online (BellevueWA.gov/city-government// departments/community-development/ neighborhoods/neighborhood-improvement-5) or by mail on the prepaid project idea request card Eastgate/Factoria residents received in the mail in late January. There is no limit on the number of project ideas you can submit, but all must be received at City Hall or submitted online by Friday, March 3.

#### Kickoff meeting for Cougar Mountain/Lakemont NEP

March 30

At the virtual meeting, 6:30 p.m., Thursday, March 30, city staff will provide Cougar Mountain/ Lakemont residents with a brief overview of the program guidelines and schedule, answer questions and invite residents to share, discuss and submit project ideas.

Project managers will be available in breakout rooms for specific project discussion. Each household in the Cougar Mountain/Lakemont neighborhood area will receive a postage-paid NEP project request form in the mail in late March. \$377,000 in NEP funding is available to the Cougar Mountain/Lakemont area.

There are 12 topics, and each session is provided at least twice. You can learn about all the topics at orientation. Topics inczlude:


- A day in the life of a code compliance officer

## PROJECT CRITERIA

#### **AFFORDABILTY**

PROJECT COSTS MUST NOT EXCEED THE FUNDING ALLOCATION FOR THE NEIGHBORHOOD AREA

#### **CONSISTENCY**

PROJECTS MUST BE CONSISTENT WITH CITY PLANS AND POLICIES

#### **FEASIBILITY**

PROJECTS MUST BE PRACTICAL AND ACHIEVABLE FOR THE CITY

#### **IMPLEMENTATION**

PROJECTS MUST BE DESIGNED AND CONSTRUCTED WITHIN 3-5 YEARS OF SELECTION

#### **MAINTAINABILITY**

PROJECTS MUST NOT REQUIRE MAINTENANCE THAT IS BURDOMESONE TO THE CITY

#### **PUBLIC BENEFIT**

PROJECTS MUST BE LOCATED ON PUBLIC PROPERTY, EASEMENTS, OR PROPERTY DESIGNATED FOR PUBLIC USE, AND MUST BENEFIT THE GENERAL PUBLIC
